### Figure 11. REJUVENATION PRUNING: DRASTIC



### Use a question protocol


A question protocol is different from the form itself, because it's about how you use the answers. It lists:

- every question you ask
- who within your organisation uses the answer to each question
- what they use the answer for
- whether an answer is required or optional
  - if an answer is required, what happens when someone enters any old thing just to get through the form.

# Tune: make questions easier to answer

Easier to:

- give your answer
- find the answer
- understand why you have to answer
